Entry requirements

What subjects does it go with?

- Any! Politics provides you with a worldview and set of skills of analysis, interpretation, evaluation and argumentation that will help you in any subject, even maths- or art-based subjects.
- That being said, there is some course overlap between Politics and History, RE, and Economics.

- 1 extract question and 1 essay question, both testing knowledge, analysis, and evaluation.


Aims of the course

Develop an interest in, and engagement with, contemporary politics


