SKILLS & STRATEGIES Procedural knowledge, literacy and numeracy skills	Year 9 will consider how music informs the audience' emotions when watching a film scene, and some of the techniques it uses to achieve this. They will also be introduced to advanced scales and chords – and are expected to apply these to a sound-less video in Garageband, matching music to movement. Singing: You've Got A Friend Mamma Mia Shenandoah	For this performance unit students will learn to play the catchy riff, harmony and melody from Bobby McFerrin's "Don't Worry Be Happy". We will consider the mood of Reggae music and analyse its unique history and musical features: the off-beat chords and laid back tempo. Singing: Three Little Birds Something Inside so Strong	Year 9 will look at music as a form of protest. Through historical and contemporary artists we will consider how messages are conveyed, and the importance of music as a communicator, influencer and aspect of democracy. They will choose to write a song / or provide an emotive piece to support a Spoken word poem. Singing: We Shall Overcome H Bombs Thunder Fields of Athenry	This unit was borne from student voice; allowing students to explore the manipulation and structuring of an original piece using a selection of 'highly sampled' tracks. Students will cut / splice / repeat and re-order using Garageband (or Logic) while also inputting original material. They will explore texture building. Singing: Something's Got A Hold of Me	Students will choose from 2 popular songs (or they can select an appropriate one of their independent choosing) to create a multi-tracked recording on Garageband. They will form and play a chord sequence, learn short melodic ideas and consider texture to maintain interest and flow in their recording. Singing: Pompeii Everything I Do Sunday Girl	Independent research and analysis skills are developed here as students pair up to produce a presentation of the musical history of their chosen genre. Students will use musical language to explain their topic, and design an activity that challenges their peers to demonstrate musical skill. Singing: Songs chosen by students / previously sung in KS3
