#### From the Head

This week has been marked by a moment of sadness and reflection, following the passing of Lisa Russell, a much-loved member of our Catering Team. Lisa gave nearly 35 years of service to St. George's, working to support both pupils and staff with kindness, dedication, and a steadfast commitment to our community. Hers was the kind of quiet service that often goes unrecognised, but it was no less vital to the life of the school. Over the past days, I have been struck by the way our staff and pupils have supported one another - offering words of comfort, acts of kindness, and a wish to honour Lisa's memory.

As we remember Lisa's service, we also take a moment to reflect on the legacy of another key figure in the history of St. George's. Yesterday marked 79 years since the death of our founder and first Headmaster, Revd Cecil Grant. It is a privilege to stand in the line of Heads that began with him and to witness the enduring strength of the vision he established. St. George's remains a school with Christian faith, and our chapel at its heart. A place where relationships matter, where coeducation thrives, and where boarding continues to shape a rich and diverse community. The legacy of his Foundation Trust also continues today, thanks to the dedication of its trustees and the generosity of those who support it. In his will, Revd Grant requested that a message be read in chapel on this day each year - a tradition we have honoured once again this week, a fitting tribute to a man whose vision continues to shape our school.

This has been a term full of remarkable achievements. Not least among these are the completion of an Ofsted inspection, major events such as concerts, drama performances, dinners, and trips, as well as sporting highlights like 'Super Saturday' - all of which represent the obvious and significant moments in a school's term. Throughout this newsletter, and in previous editions, we celebrate the extraordinary efforts of our pupils and staff, the moments of success, and the stories of resilience and joy that make St. George's what it is.

As we approach Easter, we are reminded that even in times of sorrow, we look towards the promise of renewal and hope. The resurrection of Jesus is at the heart of this season, a reminder that light follows darkness and that the future holds new opportunities for us all.


I wish all in our community a restful Easter holiday, a safe journey home to our boarders, and a safe return for the summer term. Message to be read to the School as directed in my Will

share His Victory.


Your elder brethren have given many and signal proffs that our faith has not proved to be in vain.

### **House Charities Updates**

## **Goddard**

In Goddard this year, we have raised a total of well over £1300 through our weekly tuck shops and have been actively supporting various charities. Most of



these proceeds have supported our two chosen charities for the year: Gingerbread and Sarcoma UK.

Gingerbread is a charity that serves as a vital resource for single parents who may be struggling in different areas of their lives. Sarcoma UK is a charity dedicated to funding research and providing support for those affected by sarcoma cancer.

In addition to this, we were pleased to send a donation to the Air Ambulance charity in recognition of their support following incidents at school and we have also supported the work of Great Ormond Street.

## Grant

From September, Grant House charities: WWF, Youth Talk St Al with Leukaemia and Cancer, an £1,907.97.



Each charity has a mission that we, as a nouse, value, as it was the students of Grant House which voted for these organisations. We chose charities at an international and local level, and continued the tradition to support gorillas in the WWF charity for our house mascot, the Gorilla.

Every week, we provided a vibrant tuck shop in which students from different tutor bases would bring in sweets to raise money for Charity.

We will divide the money up evenly between the three charities, so each charity will get £635.99.

## **Monk**

This year, our Monk House charities have been the national charity of Alzheimer's Society UK, which supports people with dementia across the UK, as well



as the local charity, Stepping Stones, which supports domestic abuse victims in the local area.

Throughout the year, we have been dedicated to raising funds and awareness for these causes, through our weekly tuck shops and other initiatives, to contribute as much as possible.

In addition to supporting our House Charities, we recently held a successful charity event for Great Ormond Street Hospital, raising over £400. This cause was particularly meaningful to us as it had a special connection to two Monk House students, as a way of paying respect to the hospital and their brother who sadly passed away very young.

Through numerous fundraising efforts, including bake sales and sponsored activities, we have raised hundreds of pounds for all our chosen charities, making a real difference to those most in need of our supported charities help.

## **Watts**

Watts House have managed to raise over £800 for charities such as Herts Young Homeless, Save the Children and Dog's Trust through their tuck shops. Every student in the house is



expected to contribute tuck items to sell throughout the year.

Herts Young Homeless aims to offer advice and information to homeless people between the ages of 16-24 and help break the cycle of youth homelessness.

Save the Children helps provide children across the world with medication, food and education, and Dog's Trust provides care and homes for dogs in need.

We hope that next year, even more can be raised, and thank you to everyone who has brought tuck in over the past year!


The fresh leaves, A delicate balance, Of my past and, New beginnings
