Fri 5 Programme

As part of our whole school Personal Development Strategy, we run a series of tutor-led sessions and talks and activities for the whole school during period 5 on Friday - hence its nickname 'Fri 5' (and sometimes naughtily referred to as 'Cake Friday').

This term so far, students in different year groups have had talks on challenging harassment and misogyny, student leadership, consent, online safety, careers, apprenticeships, exam preparation, discipline policy and drugs, sextortion, homelessness, option choices and revision skills.

In addition to this, tutor-led sessions have included railway safety, positive mind-set, study skills, revision skills, internet safety, World Book Week, Book Club and Careers Week.

Today, all tutor bases have been involved in Pupil Voice Week which is run termly by our Senior Prefect Team and enables and encourages all students to participate in student feedback. The Prefect Team select the focus

of each Pupil Voice and they then present the ideas and feedback to the Leadership Team for discussion and consideration.
