A perfect way to end the school week after what has been a very half term with UCAS applications, revising and EPQs.














Student Leadership

<u>ThinkuKnow</u> - the Child Exploitation and Online Protection (CEOP) Centre's own website which has been designed and written specifically for children, young people, teachers, parents and carers.

<u>Internetmatters.org</u> - specific help on how to set up internet controls at home. Guidance and articles for parents about keeping children safe online.

EBSA Coffee Mornings for Parents

EBSA stands for emotionally based school avoidance.

DSPL7 and Services for Young People run coffee mornings for parents with a child/young person in Years 5-11 who are struggling to attend school because of emotionally based needs.
