This week, we have also recognised Anti-Bullying Week at St George's through several activities, including Odd-Socks Day on Tuesday, the Year 8 Promoting Positive Relationships (PPR) Day, and our House Assemblies. St George's strives to be a school where every pupil feels safe and respected. Whenever the school hears of bullying, we are committed to addressing it—whether through individual support % actions, or through initiatives that influence the entire school community.

Since joining the school in September, I have seen how the school supports and advocates for pupils with neurodiversity. Unfortunately, misconceptions and unkind attitudes towards neurodivergence remain too common in society, and some people use SEND as a way to be unkind to others; children are no exception. Thankfully, society is slowly recognising the profound value that neurodiverse individuals bring to all organisations, from schools to businesses. Matthew Syed's book "Rebel Ideas" is an excellent book on this, highlighting the benefits of cognitive diversity, including neurodiversity, to every organisation. At St George's, we are instilling this understanding in our students through our Behaviour Curriculum, tutor-led sessions and PSHE programme, which emphasise respect and empathy.

In classrooms, pupils with SEND are supported not only by our teachers but also by our dedicated team of Learning Support Assistants (LSAs). These specialists work within departments to assist with teaching and learning. They often work one-on-one with a specific pupil, but also support any pupil in the classroom. At times, they will lead lessons to allow teachers to provide focused support to individuals or small groups. Our LSAs are highly trained and greatly valued members of the St George's community.

We hope this insight into how we support neurodiverse pupils will demystify our approach. Please discuss the role of LSAs with your child(ren) and join us in encouraging respect and appreciation for pupils with SEND and the professionals who support them.




Support for Parents and Carers


Anti-bullying book recommendations from our Literacy Lead, Mrs Goatly, which deal with bullying in a thoughtful and sensitive way

Wonder by R J Palacio




Tremendous Things by Susin Nielsen

Tremendous Things packs in plenty of humour and heart as it tells a page turning story underpinned by big emotional themes, in this case finding confidence through battling the effects of




Do You Know Me? by Libby Scott & Rebecca Westcott


Noughts and Crosses By Malorie Blackman

Promoting Positive Relationships Day for Year Eight

On Tuesday, the whole of Year 8 was taken off timetable for a 'Promoting Positive Relationships' PPR day. All students engaged in a range of workshops and activities all with the overriding aim of giving them the tools to challenge prejudices and unhelpful beliefs; recognise how stereotypes can affect power dynamics and how we can learn to be upstanders not bystanders and how to build healthy connections with our friends through recognising their 'friendship language'.

The sessions throughout the day were run by STEP including two, 'Animal Instincts' and 'Friendship Languages' which was run jointly with Year 13 students who had undergone special training to help them deliver this workshop. It was lovely to see some of our older students engaging so well with the Year 8s in these interactive sessions that look at how we can best handle conflict and the way we respond when faced with different scenarios as well as learning how to proactively spot others 'friendship language.'

Understanding healthy and positive friendships and relationships is something our Year 8 students will need to continue to do as they progress up the school and throughout their lives. PPR is a fantastic and interactive way to start both understanding this and putting it into practice.

Safety for students walking home

As daylight hours have become shorter and it's getting very dark after school quite quickly, we want to remind everyone of the importance of student safety as they travel home after school.

Please have chat with your young person and remind them of the following safety principles:

Agree on the route that your young person will take to travel home

- Encourage them to walk on busy and well-lit pathways.
- Encourage them to wear some type of hi-vis clothing or put reflective strips on their bags
- Encourage them to walk in pairs or groups especially if they are using more secluded routes
- Remind them to stay alert and not to walk with their heads in their phones.
- Remind them to look before they cross the road! Drivers cannot see them easily at this time of day.

Online Safety: Grooming

The NSPCC have recently posted data on the most common platforms that perpetrators used to target children online (in cases where the means of communication was disclosed).

- Snapchat 48%
- WhatsApp (Meta) 12%
- Facebook and Messenger (Meta) 10%
- Instagram (Meta) 6%
- Kik 5%.

Perpetrators typically used mainstream and open web platforms as the first point of contact with children.

This can include social media chat apps, video games and messaging apps on consoles, dating sites and chat rooms. Perpetrators then encourage children to continue communication on private and encrypted messaging platforms where abuse can proceed undetected.

Figures, provided by 45 UK police forces, show 7,062 Sexual Communication with a Child offences were recorded in 2023/24 – up 89% since 2017/18 when the offence first came into force.

There are age restrictions on all of these social media platforms of 13 years. Do you know what platforms your young person is using? Do you know who they are chatting to online?

Every year, we are supporting more and more young people and their families who have been victims of online grooming. Some targeting has included child sexual exploitation and some has involved child criminal exploitation. Please keep talking to your young people about how to keep themselves safe online.
