#### From the Head

A series about a teenager accused of murdering a girl from his school was the most-watched show on Netflix this week. Meanwhile, former England manager Sir Gareth Southgate expressed concerns in a lecture about boys spending excessive time on pornography, gambling, and gaming. So it has been that the media's focus has turned towards adolescence, masculinity, and the challenges facing boys today.

Even for those of us who work with young men every day, the national statistics highlighting that boys are not thriving in our schools are alarming. According to the <u>Centre for Social Justice</u>, boys' progress now lags behind girls at every educational key stage. The reasons for this are complex, and far too intricate to summarise in this newsletter. However, I believe that there are two points worth making today:

Firstly, a national issue identified by Sir Gareth Southgate is the lack of meaningful male role models for many boys - particularly role models who exemplify what might be termed "positive masculinity." To be clear, this is not something I see at St George's. Rather, I see pupils benefiting from student leaders and staff who model compassion, empathy, and emotional literacy. I acknowledge that we are far from perfect and can still improve. Nevertheless, our House system, lessons, activities, personal development, and mentoring programmes all provide boys with lots of opportunities to express themselves, learn how to lead and follow, and see positive role models in action.

However, our boys are potentially exposed to the social media and influencer culture where bad actors have rushed to fill the gap in schools and communities. We must be aware that this is having a huge influence on our boys if we don't know or understand what they are viewing on TikTok and other platforms.

My second point is that, as a community, we must avoid framing discussions about identity, masculinity, or indeed any group's welfare, as a "zero-sum game". We must resist the mistaken belief that supporting one group somehow undermines another. Advocating for girls' education, for example, does not mean boys are disadvantaged. I firmly believe that "a rising tide lifts all boats," and working to support *any* group in school benefits everyone. We are all Georgians, and our aim is to see every pupil flourish in our school.


#### **Year 10 Exams**


