

On Thursday 24th April, our qualifying team took part in the final. All students performed brilliantly and had a great time, finishing 10th out of 21 teams on the day — and 10th out of 144 teams overall! What a fantastic day out and a great opportunity for some more maths problem-solving.

Tim writes: This was an interesting and fun event held virtually where students and professors at King's College Cambridge gave different presentations about studying languages at university and where languages can take you. There were presentations on studying medieval languages of Europe; seeing how the different words would have been pronounced and how those languages have inspired today's speaking; and on studying a language from scratch in university. At the end of the day language students from King's College talked about the different jobs that involve languages such as tourism and law and explained what courses they were taking in university regarding their language learning. Overall it was a very informative and engaging event which I would definitely recommend to people wanting to do languages throughout school and in the future and people who enjoy learning languages.

Emily writes: During the Easter Break, I (and other Yr9 students across the school and country) took part in a Virtual Language Bus, run by the students at King's College. It included many sessions and guest speakers talking about a specialist subject in languages. Some of the sessions included Medieval Soundscapes, Learning Languages from Scratch and The German Reunification, all from professors who had a lot of experience and knowledge. It also ended nicely with where you can go with languages such as careers, and university courses. I enjoyed the experience a lot and highly recommended it to anyone in younger years who likes to learn language subjects both in and out of school.


Hamish writes: Over the Easter holidays, I was one of 140 students selected to take part in the inaugural King's College Virtual Language Bus. We took part in several lectures, ranging from medieval soundscapes and exploring Russian, to student-led talks and discussions on German reunification. As someone who has always loved languages and their history, this was an incredible experience. I enjoyed everything but especially the session on medieval soundscapes. It stood out because it felt most foreign from our school

curriculum - I felt like I was discovering something completely new, from the imagined sounds of medieval battles to Dante Alighieri's depiction of the terrifying sounds of hell in The Divine Comedy.

Meningitis Awareness

Today Kate Speirs came in to talk to the year 13's about the risks of meningitis at university and the vaccines available. Her eldest daughter and former Georgian, Sophia, contracted bacterial meningitis B in her first year at university. The following link contains more information. Also attached is a signs and symptoms card. All the students were given a wallet/phone case sized copy today. Kate reminded us all that 90% of cases of bacterial meningitis in the UK are meningitis B, and this is not part of the vaccine programme offered by the NHS to 14 year olds. This vaccine needs to be paid for and arranged privately with pharmacies. ASDA Pharmacies yesterday launched their meningitis B vaccine at a more competitive cost than currently offered at other pharmacies in the UK.
