Updates from the School Team

Deputy Head from April 2022—Present



At the beginning of my career 16 years ago, I applied for a post teaching maths at St George's. I am a Harpenden boy – ex-of SJL but best not to mention that in an Old Georgian's publication? – and following my Maths degrees in Leeds, I was back at home whilst teacher training at the University of Hertfordshire. I opted to hand deliver my painstakingly completed application form and carefully curated cover letter. I can still remember excitedly posting it through the little letter box below the window of school house... I never heard back.

So instead, my career started at the Priory in Hitchin and after less than 2 terms I decided my Dad was right – teaching probably isn't for you. So I submitted my resignation for the end of my NQT year – best to finish your training just in case. It was time for a rethink – a graduate scheme is working out well for your brother.

The obvious next step was becoming a scuba dive instructor in Australia (despite zero experience and an irrational distrust of fish) and for a fleeting few weeks this was genuinely the plan... but before the flights to Australia had been booked a friend persuaded me to apply to Haileybury. I ended up spending 7 years there. This included stints as a Resident Tutor in a boarding house and as Head of Maths. My time at Haileybury absolutely reaffirmed to me that I had been called to teach.

With the beginnings of a young family and firm roots in Hertfordshire, my wife and I agreed I should move back into the State Sector. I spent the next 5 years at Parmiter's, Garston, where I was quickly promoted to Assistant Head with specific responsibilities for Teaching and Learning and Assessment and Reporting. I loved working at Parmiter's but when an Assistant Head post was advertised at StG's I saw no option but to apply: "Why would you move sideways?" asked the Head at Parmiter's, "because it's St George's," I replied.

This time my application was emailed in and I asked for confirmation of receipt... suffice to say I heard back this time, joining the school in September 2019. Three VERY interesting, eventful and challenging years later the opportunity arose to apply for Deputy Headship and I am extremely grateful to Miss Barton, Mr Storrie and the Governors for trusting me with this role.

There is much more I could share about myself; I have two wonderful children (7 and 9), I am a keen (and very average) runner, and I really enjoy reading, cooking and gardening. I have still never been scuba diving. Most importantly, I am hugely passionate about education and the role schools play in shaping the lives of people. To discover that StG's is everything I hoped it would be has brought me excitement and joy. I feel humbled and incredibly fortunate every time I read Dr Watts' vision.

I look forward to serving the school and my local community for many years to come.

Catching up with the Captains

A message from our outgoing school captains:-

It is strange to think that when we took up our roles as School Captains in the Spring of 2021, the entire school cohort were cooped up at home, studying from their rooms in what was yet another national lockdown. Fast forward 14 months and whole-house assemblies have returned, Monk Corridor is as chaotic as ever, and House events are taking place seemingly every week. Fortunately, it finally feels as though orders to isolate are a distant memory. Being a part of the school's wider leadership team during this transition back to normality has presented itself with a different set of targets and challenges - we had a responsibility to reinvigorate the Georgian sense of community, particularly for our youngest students, who had had such a disrupted start to secondary school, as well as the year 12s joining us for 6th form. After spending so much time at home, face-to-face interactions with people other than your family felt like a privilege and we enjoyed our chances to engage with the student body, whether that be on Year 7 and 12 induction day, the confirmation chapels or just around the playground whilst on duty.

The role of School Captain is undoubtedly a busy one and as a team we worked hard to meet what was asked of us. Our largest investment of time was in the new Student Voice initiative, and its launch was an accomplishment we were all proud of. We began planning how this could work at the start of our tenure, and after many meetings and drafts, we were finally ready to run the first Student Voice Week a few months later. Our goal was to give all students in school the opportunity to have their say in different matters and issues, and for the student leadership team, from year nine to year thirteen, to be the drivers behind solutions and improvements. We hope that the programme will go on to create an even more inclusive and progressive environment to enable the best school experience possible for every student.

We have also had our fair share of event planning, with the Roaring Twenties themed Prefect Ball being a memorable evening for the whole prefect team. This year's SPDOF performance was also a huge success, with Mr Ellis as Taylor Swift and Miss Morris as 'the Dancing Queen' as standout performances. We raised a grand total of £2167, which was divided among our three chosen charities: British Red Cross, The National Healthcare Workers Foundation and The Mary Seacole Housing Association.

Our journey through St George's has defined our leadership as School Captains. Whether it be teamwork and resilience on the rugby pitch, studying for GCSEs we never sat, or learning the A-Level course from our bedroom, our experiences have taught us invaluable life lessons that we will take long after leaving the school. One consistency of our experience at St George's that all Old Georgians will recognise is our Houses and our School Captain team were fortunate enough to feature a member from each House. The fiery competition of house events never gets old and it was exciting to watch each House's take on their SPDOF piece before we came together and collaborated for the Senior Prefect performance. We are all grateful that in the last seven years, we have had the chance to try many new things and put ourselves outside our comfort zones. From learning camping & navigational skills for the coveted DofE Bronze award, to standing in front of our peers to present an assembly, we are leaving St George's confident and well-rounded ready to face whatever challenge comes next.

So here we are, seven years down the line. The oversized tweed blazers are now short at the sleeves and the tartan kilts are all but gathering dust. As we joined the school, a group of bright eyed youngsters afraid of being late for morning registration, we leave confident in ourselves and who the school have helped us become. It's that message that we hope to echo to those who follow us: a school career is not defined by how many detentions, or achievement points, or lates you might have racked up over the years, but by the memories that have been made with all the special people we have the privilege of interacting with everyday. We hope that as we step foot through those chapel doors and take that first tiny leap into the outside world, we can do so content with the knowledge that we have left St George's School as a place where any individual can thrive, no matter their interests, until one day it is their turn to reflect on their time here, leaving with the sentiment that they may not always attend St George's, but they will always be a Georgian striving to aim higher.

Obituaries:

Graham Pouncefort 1940—2021

Old Georgian Graham Pouncefort sadly passed away 31st December 2021.

'My love affair with the LP started almost 50 years ago at my boarding school, St George's, Harpenden, where I took music as one of my A Levels', wrote Dad in a full-page feature for International Record Review in 2006, describing his life at the service of the 'industry of human happiness'. He went on to speak of his happy days at school and that final year when he switched between music, cricket and rugby – 'utopia, or the nearest thing to it!' he declared. Dad's long and full life centred around this sacred triad. Along the way, he mentored aspiring later-to-be England cricketers and prodigious artists and their ensembles (including the Nash Ensemble, whose Artistic Director and founder, Amelia Freedman, is also a OG). St George's and his school days remained incredibly important to him, with the Choral Reunions, which I felt privileged to join, particular highlights for him. It was yet another one of those events at which he insisted on being the last out (and – I am sure! – the last in!).

His passing as 2021 drew to a close has left a cavernous void, but his legacy lives on. We were overwhelmed by the outpouring of messages that documented the precious memories he forged with cherished friends at school, as well as later on through sport and music. With the support of our mother, my brother Tom and I do our best to fill his ever-large boots through taking CRD – which is about to celebrate its 50th year as an independent classical record label – into its next chapter (you can read our statement here<<https://www.crdrecords.com/a-life-in-the-industry-of-human-happiness/>>). We meanwhile remember fondly how his time at St George's filtered down into our school days, his time on the sidelines and in the back (and front) row of concerts. For Dad, his school days clearly were some of the best of his life, and throughout his life, he continued to find ways to re-live and share them.

Michael Clarke died on 22 December 2021 after some years of suffering from Parkinson's Disease.

In addition to his very distinguished university career, particularly as Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Birmingham University, and a busy retirement, during which he was Chair of the Birmingham Royal Ballet, Michael gave years of service to the Church of England, to the Diocese of Worcester, and to Worcester Cathedral. He was a prominent member of the General Synod, and chaired several of the most contentious synod debates. His sharp mind, gentle humour, comprehension of the issues, and mastery of standing orders, made him ideal for the task. In 2018 he was awarded the Canterbury Cross for services to the Church of England.

Michael was one of the first two lay members of the Worcester Cathedral Chapter, Chair of the Cathedral Council, and Chair of the Three Choirs Festival Committee. He was a Governor of the King's School, a Governor of the University of Worcester, and a Deputy Lieutenant of the County.

Bishop John said: "Michael Clarke will be sorely missed by very many people, including me. His contribution to church and society was exceptional and exemplary: he gave of himself unstintingly for the good of others. I feel privileged to have known him, to have learned from him and to have counted him as a friend. May he be welcomed into the loving arms of the God he served so well, whose love is stronger than death."

The Dean, Peter Atkinson, said: "Michael was one of the first people I met when I came to Worcester. He remained a good friend, a wise counsellor, and a kind unofficial mentor. His faithful membership of the Church of England was rooted in his Yorkshire vicarage childhood. It was a privilege to learn from his long years of experience, often dispensed over pints of beer in a country pub."

Last week a team of young eco-warriors embarked on a mission to plant 10 saplings across the school site, in celebration of the Queen's Green Canopy. Months before, we were in meeting's planning the sapling's arrival down to every last detail. It started with the setting up of this year's Eco-team led by the three of us. In our first meeting with Mr Hollingsworth, he proposed the idea of the Queens green canopy, to plant 10 saplings in commemoration of the Queen's 70th anniversary. We knew it would take tears, sweat and a little bit of googling.

Embarking on a journey, to gain knowledge about saplings and what it takes to care for them, we put a plan together which included speaking in Assemblies to create a team of Georgians of all ages, who would help us plant the saplings. Then Tuesday afternoon rolled around, and we met a rather excited Mr Hollingsworth, who showed us that the saplings had been delivered from the Woodland Trust. From then, our plan was put into action; emails were sent and plans were created. On Thursday the team met, and accompanied by Miss Ashwell and Mr Hollingsworth, we walked the school site digging holes, filling them with compost, planting the saplings and protecting them with covers. The afternoon was a great success.

In the future, we plan to plant an Oak tree to complete the line of historic trees on the school grounds. We also plan on calculating the carbon footprint of the school to create the future environmental goals for St George's. But none of this would have been possible without the generosity of members of the school community, our fellow students, and of course Carpenters Nursery who supplied us with all of the necessary soils to help nourish the tree's for years to come. Praying for peace It has been lovely to see our young people respond in both practical and prayerful ways this week. We have prayed in each of the four House Chapels the words below: “God of peace, your prophet Isaiah promised swords would be turned into ploughshares, and your son’s mother Mary proclaimed the mighty would be put down and the humble exalted: visit the people of Ukraine; deliver them from fear, violence, attack, injury, destruction, death; and give them courage, solidarity and allies in their hour of vulnerability and sorrow. This term St George's will be giving a warm welcome to families from the Ukraine who have escaped the dangers of the conflict that continues in their own country and who have been rehoused in the local area. As some of the children of these families will be continuing their education at our school, it is an opportune moment to explore the archives and recall a similar role that St George's played in the First World War, and also remind ourselves how the school benefited from a rehousing scheme that occurred during the Second World War.

In the First World War over 250,000 Belgian refugees were rehoused in England and Wales. In Hertfordshire many families were rehoused in Hitchin but more locally the school archives reveal that in 1915 a family of 4 were rehoused in Wheathampstead; Mr and Mrs Limbosh and their son Pierre and daughter Monique who had been evacuated from Brussels. Mr Limbosh worked for a time at Rothamsted as a scientist before enlisting in the Belgian army and returning to fight. Mrs Limbosh and the two children remained and attended St George's from December 1915 to July 1919. Pierre was 10 years old and Monique 9 years when they started at school.

Pierre was so grateful to the school for supporting his family during that period of his life that he returned to St George's in 1991 to present a gift to the Chapel. Pierre paid for a new altar cloth to be made and it is the same altar cloth that we use today. It was designed by Mr Miller who was at the time Head of Art.

In the summer of 1940 St George's rented a large manor house and the 16 acres of adjoining land in Paschoe, Devon for the duration of the war. Around 50 younger boarders aged 7-14 years were taken there under the supervision of Mr and Mrs Montauban and several other staff. (You may recall the Monty's programme at St George's during lockdown which was named in Mr Montauban's honour.)

The school took this precautionary step not because they felt that Harpenden was a particularly dangerous place during the war but because they felt 'it desirable that young children should have peaceful surroundings beyond the reach of the noise and disturbance caused by the air raid alarms.

In many ways it is sad to think that more than 100 years after first coming to the aid of families displaced by war the school will once again be called upon to provide help. Perhaps it is better to reflect with a sense of pride that our brilliant school could once again step up and fulfil Cecil Grant's expectation; that St George's be a Christian school not only in name, but one demonstrated by its actions.

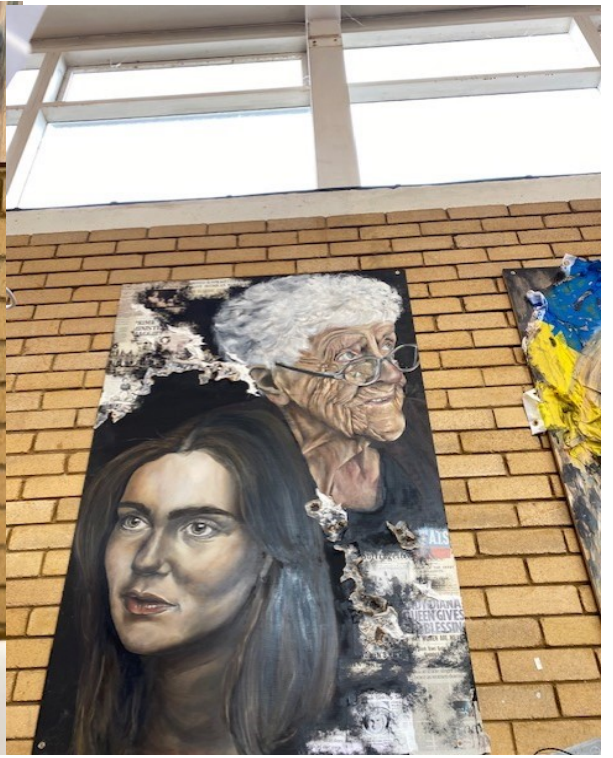

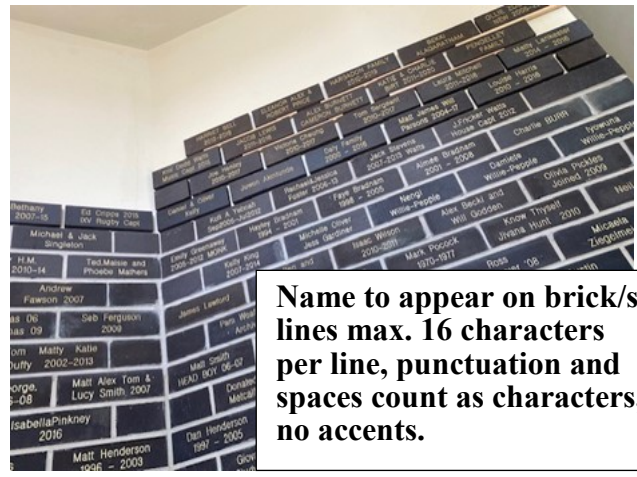
