THIS WEEK WE ARE CELEBRATING OLD GEORGIAN, POLLYANNA HOPE



I started my working career on a building site, as assistant to the engineer telling builders where to dig/build as a holiday job aged 15 at RAF Hendon, London.

My next work experience was in Newcastle, painting fiberglass skylights, gave me Dosh for college,

While at College I worked in the Rusacks Marine 5 Star Hotel in St Andrews washing up (aerodynamics of circular discs) and prepping afternoon teas.

Moved up to erecting scaffolding aged 21 after leaving College whilst looking for a proper job..

Then joined BAe Warton as a graduate stress engineer working on Tornado, and Jaguar composite wing A/C.

Projects that I worked on included, the space shuttle, air released weapons, A300, and VC10 tanker.

Moved to Bristol at S&H and worked on Submarines for MoD, initially U boats, but also O & P, & S & T, nuclear power stations and bulk handling machines, worked at S&H for 7 & 1/2 yrs.

Returning to BAe at Filton to work firstly on A330/340 A/C Checkstress, then on single aisle A320 A321,A319 A318, and A300, A310, and Concorde as a Loads engineer.

Then to my Last post as a Test engineer involved with Major Fatigue tests of A330/340 EIS, A340-600, A380, A300F, A400M, A320ESG, A320MLG ESG, A380MLG, and Nimrod. Became Union rep for the Office, and a STEM Ambassador (Women in engineering, and Teaching reading in junior school), also Joined Airbus choir (first time singing, since School choir)

Think I've earned retirement for a while at least to catch some breath.

What's next adventure going to Be? Logic, says the final frontier I guess.!



News from our Old Georgians



Chris Green, Teacher at St George's 1958-1965

I first saw St. George's at the end of the Christmas term in 1956. I was doing a PGCE, following a Classics degree, at Cambridge, and Mr Gedge, then Headmaster of St. George's, had come to deliver a lecture about Coeducation. 95% of schools were single-sex then, but having found my all-boys public school a bit austere I thought co-education sounded a better idea. The school invited me to come and see. I had a great time, and ended up being offered a job, which I accepted with alacrity.

So in September 1958, aged 23, dead keen but fairly wet behind the ears, I began seven very happy years at St. George's. I was junior Housemaster in the boys' boarding house at Crosthwaite (then in Carlton Road opposite the railway line), where I had a small bedsitting room. I taught Latin with some French. Madame Subotic drafted me onto "la table francaise", where in the then staff room, a dozen luckless pupils ate lunch talking only French; memories of that stay with me, as when Madame told a young man "fermez la porte" and he responded with "Benedictus benedicat per Iesum Christum Dominum Nostrum", or the rather weedy boy who told me in a quiet voice "Je suis un non-fish".

I loved teaching, and had lots of really good classes. After a few years we started Greek. I had two Classical sixths, of who two went on to study Classics at Oxbridge. I organised Junior Colts cricket and Junior Colts rugby, and enjoyed all aspects of St. George's life, the Christmas Reviews, the 6B Dance, the staff v girls lacrosse match, and much more, all of it unforgettably great fun.

While I was there the school moved from being independent into the state system - a great example of how independent schools can integrate into the state system without losing character or heritage.

For me 1965 was time to move on. Since university I had been involved in the French national system of children's residential summer camps or "colonies de vacances", and had always believed British children would really benefit from something similar here. Thanks to the help of a leading educationist whose son was at St.George's, I was able to start Colony Holidays for Schoolchildren, with a launching grant from the then Ministry of Education, and a governing Council of the great and the good. I moved to Worcestershire, near the Malvern Hills, and have lived here ever since.

Colony Holidays grew fast. Some 5,000 children per annum took part in the "colonies", and hundreds of young adults trained and worked as camp leaders. To my delight a link with St. George's survived, since my friend Leslie Deane kindly arranged for me to come back and tell children and parents about Colony Holidays. Lots of Georgians took part, and I remember lots of them enjoying special holiday moments on the edge of Loch Rannoch, in the Lake District, or among the Welsh mountains.

After sixteen years with Colony Holidays I returned to teaching, and had twelve enjoyable years at The Chase High School in Malvern. Here I taught French and German, though after a few years we did introduce Latin GCSE in the sixth form. I produced plays, including James Elroy Flecker's "Hassan" with the award winning school orchestra playing the Delius music written specially for it, at Malvern Festival Theatre. I also organised French exchanges at Year 9 and at Lower sixth level.

Then "retirement" saw the creation of a new summer camp organisation (Colony Holidays had closed a few years after I left), in the shape of Active Training and Education (ATE Superweeks). There have been some great camps, but it is hard today to attract parents who are unused to the idea, to send their children. So, at the age of nearly ninety, I am now national Co-ordinator of The Summer Camps Trust, which aims to make going to summer camp as much a part of British children's lives as it is of American or French children's lives. It is still fulfilling, and fun. Children today need it more than ever

I would love to hear from anyone who remembers me, from St George's or from Colony Holidays, or who is interested in The Summer Camps Trust. I have had a great life and enjoyed every minute. My warmest thanks to St. George's and to all the lovely young people I met through the school.

Cecil Grant

He chose the StG's buildings as they included a chapel, and in 1907 he moved 57 staff and students from Cumbria to the leafy small town in Hertfordshire. Cecil was a pioneer, someone who thought outside the box; was willing to take a different path to others; and in his own small way was willing to challenge the social norms of the day. He was passionate about supporting what we deemed to be important elements of British life such as patriotic service. I cannot imagine what it would have been like to have supported those members of the school community who fought and gave their lives in WW1. The conversation he must have dreaded most was telling the then Head Girl that her beau had been killed in action. But he was also willing to challenge areas of the social norm which he felt did not serve his students well.

I do not think we can underestimate how radical the idea of children from the same family being able to be schooled together really was. He served our school well, only retiring in 1936 to look after his beloved wife. His retirement property overlooked the playing fields and he remained committed to us as an Institution even beyond his death, leaving a legacy in his will that enabled the birth of the Cecil Grant Founder's Trust - an organisation that many of you still contribute to today.

Despite having a wobbly track record at times, 117 years later his school is still standing and I would hope that if he is looking down on us still he would be able to recognise some of those fundamental values, that he held so dear, alive and kicking within our community.


