#### From the Head

On Tuesday evening, we gathered in Chapel for our annual **Senior Prize-giving**, one of the highlights of the school year. It was a joy to welcome back so many of our recent leavers, who joined current pupils in celebrating their achievements and receiving special awards and scholarships. Prize-giving is a moment when the whole community pauses to recognise the effort, perseverance and character that lie behind the results and awards our children achieve.

The individual citations about pupils, read on the evening by staff, reflected not only the outstanding accomplishments of our young people, but also how well known, understood and valued they are by those who guide them. Listening to those words, it was clear that success at St George's is never simply about results. It is about growth, resilience, kindness, and the contribution each pupil makes to the life of the school.

Looking ahead, I would like to take this opportunity to remind our community that next year's **Senior Prize Day** will take place on 15th July, on the same day as all our other prize-giving ceremonies, in the summer. Pupils who are currently in Year 13 should please ensure that they keep this date free to attend.

Finally, I wish to remind parents of the opportunity to contribute to the life of the school by serving as a **parent governor**. Governors play a vital role in shaping the strategic direction of St George's, supporting and challenging leaders, and ensuring that we remain true to our ethos and values. It is a role that requires commitment and time, but it is also deeply rewarding, allowing parents to share their skills, insight and experiences for the benefit of the whole school community.

#### Renewing our windows and doors

This Summer saw the start of our major £800,000 project to replace a total of 30 doors and over 200 windows across our site. Made possible by our success in securing a £550,000 Government capital improvement grant and support from the School's Foundation Company, this work will significantly improve our security and overall energy efficiency. The works carried out over the Summer have already made a huge difference, with tired parts of the School looking new again, and creating a better teaching and working environment for everyone.

Scaffolding is now up around the site as we prepare for the next phase of installations. This will see the replacement of around 160 old crittall and timber-framed windows in our older buildings. These will be replaced with modern, timber-framed designs to reflect the heritage of these buildings. We anticipate this phase to start shortly after half-term.



#### **New Computing and Music Classrooms**

It hasn't just been all about windows and doors over the Summer! We have relocated and modernised our two main computing classrooms to bring them into a new combined maths and computing block. Decked out with modern PCs and the latest interactive flat screen technology, these new classrooms bring a fresh look and feel for this important part of our curriculum. We have also relocated our music classrooms, allowing us to create a new dedicated rehearsal space and redesign the layout of our music teaching areas.

Through the support of the Cecil Grant Founder's Trust, our music classrooms now have the latest mac technology installed. Pupils are very much enjoying the new spaces along with our teachers!

Last Friday, 17 students and 3 staff ventured into London for a walking food tour. It was a fantastic day learning about the history of the East End, including Spitalfields Market and Brick Lane with an array of delicious food to sample. The students had the opportunity to try:

- Karapincha: Sri Lankan street food. Kottu Roti
- Bangladeshi cuisine: handmade samosa, paneer roll, Bangladeshi Shingara, pakora or onion bhaji
- Chocolate truffles and a hot chocolate from Dark Sugars, a Ghanaian chocolatier
- Famous salted beef or cream cheese bagels from Biegel, London's oldest Jewish bagel bakery

• Artisanal vanilla bean custard or raspberry jam sourdough doughnuts from Crosstown

For their final stop, they visited <u>Humble Crumble</u>, started by Old Georgian **Kim Innes**. Kim made her first crumble as a Year 7 at St George's and kindly organised complementary crumbles for our final stop of the day. The crumbles were beautifully presented and <u>almost</u> too good to eat. It was a superb experience and a very filling day!


