From the Head

As we approach the final few weeks of term, I hope all our students can use the long weekend to get some well-deserved rest. Please encourage them to recharge their batteries so they are ready for the final push before the Christmas holiday!

Coming to school every day is vital. Research published by the Department for Education (DfE) consistently shows a clear link between attendance and attainment; put simply, pupils who attend school regularly are far more likely to achieve their full potential in their exams and future pathways.

With that in mind, I am incredibly pleased to report that our current overall attendance stands at 97.1%. This is a remarkable achievement by our pupils. In fact, data showed we were the best attending secondary school in Hertfordshire throughout September and October, and we are currently holding strong as the 2nd best in the county for November.

It is brilliant to see that our pupils genuinely want to be here every day. However, we know that winter bugs are circulating. To support parents in decision-making, we are following the Chief Medical Officer's advice: it is right to send children to school with mild respiratory illnesses (runny nose, sore throat, slight cough). They should only stay home if they have a high temperature (fever), have vomited or had diarrhoea (in which case 48 hours off school) or do not feel well enough to carry out normal activities.

Attendance & Procedures Update: A Message from Mr Ede

We would like to extend a very warm welcome to **Mrs. Flemming**, who has joined our administrative team as our new Attendance Officer. She will be working closely with us to ensure our records are accurate and our students are supported.

Reporting Absences - We need your help to ensure accurate and timely reporting of attendance:

• Reporting Illness via Edulink: The preferred method for reporting student illness is now via the Edulink app. This ensures the information is communicated directly to the necessary staff. Please remember that a student needs to be unwell for the whole day to be marked absent.

Planned Absences: If you are requesting a planned absence (such as a medical appointment that
cannot be scheduled outside school hours), we require a minimum of 48 hours' notification to process
the request effectively.

Mock Exam Attendance (for Y11 and Y13) Mock exams are a vital part of your child's preparation for their formal qualifications. We encourage you to treat these days with the same seriousness as the final summer exams. With this in mind:

- **Urgent Contact:** If your child is expected to be absent on a day they are due to sit a mock exam, please **contact the school office immediately**.
- **Rescheduling:** Please be aware that rescheduling mock exams is extremely difficult due to complex timetabling and invigilation requirements; missing a paper can significantly disrupt a student's access to important feedback.

School Holidays and Term Time Leave We understand that booking holidays outside of school breaks can be appealing. However, we must remind all parents that holidays should **not** be booked during scheduled term time. This includes the last day of term.

The school is not permitted to authorise leave for holidays during term time. Taking children out of school for holidays causes significant disruption to their learning. Please plan your holidays strictly for the designated school holiday periods.

Rugby Friday Nights Light Up

On Friday 14th November 2025, St George's 1st XV came out with a mission – to break the 13-year cycle of not securing a victory over St Albans School (SAS) in what has become *the* local school rugby derby. It was a wild night under the floodlights, bringing together a combination of rain, momentous support for both sides (plus a band!) and some tense and electrifying rugby.

Albert NK described the match: "It was a 'brutal' first half. The match kicked off at full pace, with huge tackles from both sides and whilst St George's looked more dominant physically, punching holes in the SAS line and controlling territory early on, but ill-discipline cost them valuable points. Two penalties in dangerous areas suddenly handed them the lead by 14 points. Soaked and punished for errors, St George's heads could have dropped. They didn't. Instead, St George's spotted space, made a clean line break, chipped ahead, and won the foot race to touch down followed by a secure conversion for a halftime score of 14-7.

Whilst the second half saw St George's put on a tireless onslaught of attack, the points just wouldn't come. Then in the final minutes of the match, St George's gave their all, breaking through the SAS defence to score and convert and bring the score line to 17-14. The atmosphere was alive with cheers of support to drive the St George's boy's momentum. And it worked. A penalty came moments later securing a draw... but a draw against St Albans wasn't what St George's had trained for. With a penalty advantage, a high cross field kick was launched and plucked from the sky to be taken over the try line and see St George's 1st XV break the cycle and win the match 19-17".

This was an evening to remember, particularly for parents who have been at the school for many years watching their boys play rugby in St George's colours and a moment to celebrate the sporting effort, resilience, and determination of the school. The support from fellow students (from both schools), ex-students, the teachers and parents and siblings, was an example of how St George's is not just a school, but a community.

Year 13 visit to the British Film Institute

Nana (y13) writes: On Wednesday 12th November, we visited the British Film Institute in London for an A-Level French film study day alongside students from other schools. The day began with an engaging introduction to *La Nouvelle Vague*, followed by an interactive workshop exploring a range of film-making techniques and genres. It was an insightful experience that encouraged us to share our ideas while learning from one another. We viewed excerpts from several films and took notes in a workbook provided for us, giving us useful material to take back to school.

After a refreshing lunch break in the city, we watched *La Haine*, the film we are currently studying. Seeing it on the big screen added a new level of intensity and helped us appreciate its themes in greater depth. It was a rewarding and inspiring trip that strengthened both our understanding of French cinema and our enthusiasm for the subject.



Year Seven's Quality of Life in School Survey (QUALIS)

Last week, year sevens visited the computer rooms to complete QUALIS - a survey which captures what it's like to be a year seven at St. George's. We have been completing this survey since 2002 so we have many years of comparative data! We will be sharing this data with the students but thought we would share some highlights with you:

In the last two weeks:

- 96% of students have had another student say something nice to them
- 97% of students have had another student smile at them
- 96% of students have not experienced any unkindness online
- 82% of students have been lent an item that they had forgotten by another student
- 84% of students had been told a joke by another student
- 90% of students have been invited to join in a game by another student.

Experiences are very similar across all houses. Monk has the highest average for receiving kind words and being comforted, while Watts and Grant report feeling left out the least. Differences between houses are small, indicating a consistent experience for students regardless of house.

They have had a great first term at StG's.

Celebrating National Non-Fiction November!

Recent research by the National Literacy Trust found that more children and young people who read non-fiction were motivated to read for educational purposes, to satisfy curiosities, to foster social connections and to support their mental wellbeing. Providing students with the opportunity to read and explore non-fiction plays a vital role in helping them to learn about their world, as well as fostering reading for pleasure.

In consultation with Directors of Learning and subject staff, the Library aims to provide students with access to a high quality, relevant and engaging non-fiction collection.





This month we have been showcasing an impressive selection of Art and History books, so we are taking the opportunity during National Non-Fiction November to share some of these new additions.


