## From the Head

### Update on Chapel this Term

This term, our chapel series has explored a theme inspired by *Who Do You Think You Are?*, the BBC genealogy series. The Rev and other members of staff have been guiding pupils through the ancestry of Jesus from Matthew's Gospel. Matthew traces Jesus's lineage back to Abraham, and throughout the term we have reflected on how figures such as Jacob, Rahab, Ruth, Solomon and of course, Mary help illuminate Jesus's identity. Each talk has considered how His story is shaped and foreshadowed by those who came before him. Jesus doesn't stand alone. He's a part of history, part of the story of the Jews and God's desire to be in relationship with all humanity.

At the same time, I have been reading a book by Owen Eastwood called *Belonging*. In it he sets out the Māori concept of *Waka Pāpā*, which expresses the idea that each of us stands in a long line of ancestors, and that understanding our place in that line helps us feel more grounded, connected, and whole. Just as Jesus's story is enriched by his heritage, so too our own sense of identity is strengthened when we understand the people and stories that have shaped us.

This time of year offers many of us the opportunity to reconnect with family, friends, and traditions that give us a sense of grounding. And we also do this in school; whether it's by taking part in one of our Carol Services, sharing Christmas Dinner on Wednesday, exchanging gifts in tutor bases, or just by enjoying the decorations around school, we are reminded that we are part of a community that goes back in time. These are our traditions, and they connect us to those who came before us.

We will bring this chapel series to its conclusion next week, culminating on the final day of term with a focus on Jesus himself. I hope you will speak with your young people about what they have been hearing and considering in chapel this term, as we draw together the threads of this rich and rewarding series.

### A Busy Week at St George's

This week has been busy as we head towards the end of term! The week started with an amazing Junior Carol service where over 60 pupils played, sang and read in Chapel (see the report below).

Meanwhile, Year 11s have been focused on finishing their mock exams and return to lessons next week. Over the last half-term, some of our Year 12 students have attended evening lectures at KCL and UCL on a range of political and economic topics.

Talks have ranged from 'Votes for 16+' to 'wealth tax'. The organisers of the events have commented on the confidence and academic dexterity of our students. They have asked questions to an expert panel in an audience of academics and university students. This exposure to high level academia and super curricular opportunities are so important for university applications and we look forward to providing them with more of these opportunities next term. These include a trip to Balliol College, Oxford and visits from Old Georgians and Oxbridge professors.

## Please help us keep everyone safe and well for Christmas

The 48-hour sickness rule is a guideline, mainly for schools, childcare, and food service, stating that anyone with vomiting or diarrhoea must stay home/away until they've been symptom-free for a full 48 hours (two days) to prevent spreading infections like norovirus. This strict policy applies to everyone, regardless of how well they seem otherwise, because germs can linger, and it protects vulnerable people from highly contagious viruses. If someone vomits at school, they usually need to go home and can't return until two days after the last episode.

Key aspects of the rule:

- When it starts: The clock starts after the last bout of sickness or diarrhoea.

- Why it's enforced: To stop the easily spread germs (viruses, bacteria) that cause stomach bugs from circulating in close-contact settings.
- Who it affects: Children in schools/nurseries, staff, and anyone working with open food.
- What to do: Stay home, rest, drink fluids, and avoid spreading germs.
- When to see a doctor: Consult a doctor if symptoms are severe, prolonged (over 2 days for adults, less for babies/young children), or if there are signs of dehydration.

Please do not send children back before the 48-hour period as they will be sent back home!
